

The String Family




Can you name all five instruments of the string family?

(clue - guitar is not one! We'll explain later.....)

One minute.....ready.....steady.....go!



STRING FAMILY



How many did you get? One point for each (bonus point for the harp!)

The <u>Violin</u> is the smallest member of the string family. It is played by placing it on your left shoulder and either plucking with your finger and bowing the strings. It has four strings (**G D A E**) and makes the highest sound.

The <u>Viola</u> is the next biggest member of the string family. It is played in the same way as the violin. It is bigger than the violin and slightly deeper (see in the picture how big it is on the player?). It has four strings (**C G D A**) - three are exactly the same as the violin. The viola is just missing the high E string.

The <u>Cello</u> is the next biggest string instrument. It is played by placing in between your knees (there is a spike that reaches the floor) — definitely don't put this on your shoulder! It has the same strings as the viola (**C G D A**), though each string is deeper. Here is an example of the cello....

The <u>Double Bass</u> is the biggest member of the string family. Players normally have to stand up or sit on a stool to play. They are the deepest (lowest) string instrument and can be 6 foot tall! It also has four strings (**E A D G**) - can you spot that this is the same as the violin, just backwards?

The <u>harp</u> is the final member of the string family. Instead of using a bow like the rest, the strings are only plucked. The number strings can vary depending on what type of harp, but most modern harps have 47 strings and 7 pedals, which the player controls with their feet (epic hand-eye-foot coordination needed!).
