Subjunctive mood

A verb is in the subjunctive mood when it expresses a condition which is doubtful or not factual. It is most often found in a clause beginning with the word if. It is also found in clauses following a verb that expresses a doubt, a wish, regret, request, demand, or proposal.

A prefix is a group of letters that you can add to the beginning of a root word to change the meaning of the word.

eg. mis + fortune = misfortune

mis-	'wrong' or 'badly' eg 'misspelled' or misspelt means 'wrongly spelled'				
sub-	'under' eg ' sub way' means 'a way under the ground'				
pre-	'before in time', 'in front of' or 'superior' eg 'prepacked' means 'packed before'				
un-	'not' (there are also several other prefixes which mean 'not)' eg 'unhurt' means 'not hurt'

Reread your Jabberwocky description from yesterday: How can you improve it? Can you spot any mistakes? Have you included all the success criteria?


Success criteria:

substitute




Now you have completed your editing, you need to write you final version.
